Re: June 2024 Monthly City Council Report

In June 2024, the Chief Tracy Frazzano and Accreditation and Grants Coordinator Katie Hofmeister attended the Florida Police Chiefs Association's Annual Summer Conference to accept the Rocky Pomerance and Civilian Employee of the Year Awards.

The MIPD was awarded the Rocky Pomerance Law Enforcement Excellence Award for its contributions to "Operation PAC the Sleigh" which was developed as a community-oriented policing approach to providing, assisting and contributing (PAC) to Marco Island's citizens in need. Through the Christmas First Responder Style, Pickleball with the Police Toys for Tots Drive and the Marco Lake Toy Run, the MIPD was able to connect with members of the community to provide tangible resources and build lasting relationships.

Accreditation and Grants Coordinator Katie Hofmeister received the 2023 Civilian of the Year award for her contributions to the Department. Accreditation and Grants Coordinator Hofmeister was recognized for her accomplishments including past assignments as Records Clerk and Social Media and Public Education Specialist and presently as the Accreditation and Grants Coordinator, where she has shown her dedication to ensuring agency excellence as well as her willingness to accept new challenges and responsibilities.

The Marco Island Police Department is honored to serve and protect the citizens of Marco Island and believes in sharing the same foundational values of community engagement, public service, relationship building and fostering a positive environment to the community.





June Police Activity Crime report:

In June 2024, 41 incidents were reported to the Marco Island Police Department. Total crimes against persons remained the same compared to the same period last year. Property crimes decreased in June 2024 by 20%. Miscellaneous crimes showed a decrease of 17%. In June 2024, crimes against society, such as DUI and narcotic incidents, remained the same as last year. The Marco Island Police Department had 5 arrests in June of 2024 for incidents including domestic violence related aggravated assault, out of county warrant, driving under the influence, and possession of narcotics.



This reporting aligns with new crime data collection requirements from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the FBI. This announcement for crime reporting was covered in the February 2022 monthly report.

Non-criminal incidents are reports that do not have a criminal offense or are information reports. Examples include fraud cases (outside of Marco Island jurisdiction), other agency assists, lost and found items and medical assists.


2023 vs 2024 Incident Crime Trends

In June 2024, there were 18 non-criminal incidents reported. 22% of non-criminal incident reports were comprised of suspicious activities. 12% of reports were referencing assistance to other agencies including Collier EMS, Marco Island Fire Department, and other law enforcement agencies. 28% of non-criminal incident reports are for lost and found property.



June Traffic Patrol

In June 2024, there were 153 traffic citations and warnings issued by the Marco Island Police Department. Of the 67 citations issued 33% were for failure to obey traffic signs or traffic lights, 22% were due to an excess in posted speed and 33% of citations were for operating a motor vehicle with an expired registration or driver's license. Other citations issued were for violations including safety belt infractions, improper passing, and illegal U-turns. In June 2024, the Marco Island Police Department seized 6 licenses during traffic stops due to license suspensions or revocations. 1 license plate was seized during a traffic stop



June Reserve / Auxiliary Program Activity Hours

Reserve and Auxiliary Police Officers are unpaid volunteers who are certified by the State of Florida to perform in the law enforcement role. These officers must meet the Department's and State of Florida's annual retraining / certification requirements. Reserve and Auxiliary personnel are required to volunteer a minimum of 16 hours per month. They perform a variety of functions for our department and community which are outlined in the chart below. Once a month Reserve and Auxiliary Officers have a staff meeting to review policy changes, attend training and address planning and logistical requirements.

Aid to Other Agency – Detectives assisted FWC with an investigation into the death of a protected animal.

Battery – An investigation into a battery was closed due to a lack of cooperation by the victim.

Criminal Mischief – Investigation closed when a suspect(s) could not be identified through a follow- up investigation.

Petit Theft – An investigation was suspended when the victim could not turn over surveillance video that was thought to exist and all leads were exhausted.

Petit Theft – An investigation was suspended after all leads had been checked, and a suspect(s) could not be identified. **Check Fraud** – After extensive follow-up investigation and check of records, suspect(s) could not be identified, nor could a venue be established for the crime.

Petit Theft – After checking leads to include surveillance video a suspect could not be identified, nor could the victim locate a serial number for his bicycle.

Check Fraud – Reporter has been reimbursed by his bank, and it has been determined that the fraud occurred outside of the city limits and State of Florida.

Criminal Mischief – The victim did not want to pursue criminal charges and decided that they only wanted the police report as documentation for insurance purposes.

Battery – After an investigation was initiated, the victim contacted the detective bureau and stated that she did not want to pursue charges.

June Marine Report

Marine officers observed steady boater traffic throughout the month.

Officers conducted vessel safety and sanitation inspections of anchored vessels in Smokehouse and Factory bays. All vessels were following Coast Guard regulations.

On June 3rd, Marine officers responded to a boat on fire at

the mouth of the Marco River. Marine officers arrived first on scene and were able to locate the passengers of the vessel which had evacuated to a different vessel. The fire was extinguished by two fire boats which arrived on scene shortly after. On June 7^{th,} Marine officers responded to a call involving two jet skis that had run aground south of Cape Ramano.

On June 12th Marine officers responded to two MERT calls. The first was in Factory Bay in which a boat was sinking. Officers on scene made sure that no one was on board the sinking vessel. The Coast Guard was notified of the situation and responded to assist. The second MERT call was a sailboat in Collier Bay that was dragging its anchor. Officers responded to the location and were able to anchor the vessel in a safe area before any damage was done.

Beach Report

June 2024 showed a significant decrease in beach events due to the onset of the rainy season. Beach events are concurrent with this time last year.



Code Enforcement:

Due to increased rainfall in June, the monthly report reflects the highest number of enforcement violations in overgrown weeds violations. rash violations were the second highest. Encroachments had the third highest quantity of violations. Pruning schedules may need to be accelerated depending on the type of shrubs, amount of rain, and with consideration of their proximity to the sidewalk.

June Special Magistrate Hearing

The Special Magistrate Hearing took place on June 25, 2024. There were 30 cases, 29% of which were related to weed violations. Encroachment violations comprised 18% of the cases. Mitigation of Fines cases made up 13 % of the docket.



Code Enforcement Protected Species

Since the beginning of Sea Turtle nesting season, Marco Island has located 85 sea turtle nests. MIPD Code Enforcement and our City of Marco Island Environmentalist have recorded 214 false crawls this year as compared to 361 for the same time frame last year. The MIPD has continued sea turtle lighting patrols, which resulted in 10 violations being detected. 9 NOVs were issued, and 1 verbal warning. During these night patrols, education and verbal warnings were given to guests on the beach using flashlights or cell phone lights.



Code Enforcement: Water Quality

Code Enforcement issued a total of 30 notices for MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System) violations during the month of June 2024.

22 violations were issued for missing or damaged silt fences. 11 cases were closed upon compliance while the other 11 remain Open/Non-Compliant and will be scheduled for the next magistrate hearing.

6 notices were issued for Illicit Discharge/Stormwater Pollution violations. 1 case was closed upon compliance, while 5 remain Open/Non-Compliant and will be scheduled for the next magistrate hearing.

2 notices were issued for illegal dumping violations. 1 case was closed upon compliance while the other remains Open/Non-Compliant and will be scheduled for the next magistrate hearing.






Marco Island Police Department, **Collier County** Sheriff's Office, FHP, and a State **Alligator Trapper** removed an alligator in the early morning.




