- Frost Tender: It is highly sensitive to frost. Temperatures below 32°F can damage the tree, and temperatures around 25°F are fatal, limiting its use to hardiness zones 10B-11 (primarily South Florida coastal areas).
- **Pests/Galls:** While generally healthy, it can occasionally be affected by small caterpillars that make a mess of the leaves or mites that induce odd, horn-like galls. These are generally minor issues.
- **Growth Rate:** It is not a fast-growing tree.

The UF/IFAS review emphasizes that the 'Shady Lady' is a **gorgeous and sustainable choice for the right location** (warm, coastal South Florida). Potential planters should be aware of its frost tender nature and the potential for fruit-related staining before committing.
