Contract Negotiations

Collective Bargaining sessions were conducted with the Professional Firefighters of Marco Island on August 5th, 22nd and 29th. Tentative Agreement has been reached on eighteen of thirty contract articles. The next session is scheduled for September 9th. A Closed Session with City Council was conducted on August 14th. The City's Negotiation Team consists of Assistant City Manager Casey Lucius, Fire Chief Chris Byrne and Deputy Chief Matt Marshall.

Southwest Florida Regional Medical Guidelines

Our Paramedics have been participating in intensive training in preparation of the Southwest Florida Regional Medical Guidelines "go live" date of October 1st. The Guidelines standardize the medical treatment protocols across Collier, Lee, Hendry and Charlotte Counties. The advantage of this standardization is to provide consistency to the receiving Hospitals, regardless of the location of the incident, the common medical treatment protocols are utilized. Additionally, the Guidelines are developed by a consortium of Medical Directors from Advanced Life Support provider agencies and Emergency Physicians from the hospital systems.

Fire Apparatus


Engine 50: Out of service from September 17th to 28th (11 days) due to an engine exhaust issue.

Project Update

High Water Fire Engine

 Staff & Manufacturer completed engineering review. Delivery is expected in March 2026. This project includes \$212,000 in Legislative Appropriation funding which was successfully reappropriated in the State 2025-26 budget.

Notable Highlights & Activities

1. Fire Investigation

On August 6, fire operations extinguished an outdoor kitchen fire involving a gas-fueled grill installed within combustible wood cabinetry. The fire caused charring and soot beneath the grill, heat damage to adjacent cabinetry, and debris in the enclosed space below. It was determined to be accidental, resulting from the close proximity of combustible materials and accumulated grease. The Fire Marshal advised obtaining permits for repairs, contacting insurance if filing a claim, notifying the gas utility before restoring service, and completing repairs and a gas inspection before the grill is returned to use.

2. Code Conformance Support

Fire Prevention staff took part in six coordination sessions with contractors and design professionals, focused on guiding projects toward fire and life safety code conformance during the design and construction phases.
