Subject: Public Works Departmental Report – August 2023

The City's public works department currently has 13 full time employee (FTE) positions as follows:

- (1) director, (1) Infrastructure & construction manager, (1) stormwater engineer [vacant],
- (1) administrative/project coordinator, (1) supervisor, (1) streets & drainage coordinator, (1) right of way coordinator, (4) maintenance workers, (1) street sweeper operator, and (1) water truck operator.

The department is currently operating with 12 full-time employees since the stormwater engineer position is currently vacant.

The following summarizes the department's notable activities over the month of June:

2023 Annual Street Resurfacing

- Resurfacing is complete.
- The following 14 streets were resurfaced:

Proposed Ordinance to Regulate Service Provider Installations within City Rights of Way

- Summitt Broadband is nearing completion of their island-wide fiber optic infrastructure installations.
- There are several vertical cabinets that Summit installed in the swales that the City has asked Summit to relocate to property corners.
- Summit's contractors have caused damage to the city's irrigation (sprinkler), sanitary sewer, storm sewer, and potable water infrastructure. The City is awaiting reimbursement for the costs incurred relating to these damages.
- Summit will soon complete their infrastructure installations, and the City does not have many options to compel Summit to relocate the cabinets or to reimburse the City for incurred costs.
- Other municipalities have required restoration bonds from communications service providers as part of the permit and regulation process for allowing installations in their rights of way.
- Three other communications providers are seeking to permit and install infrastructure within the city's rights of way.
- The city needs an ordinance requiring service providers to provide a restoration bond and to enforce compliance with City regulations and requirements for these infrastructure installations.
- Staff has directed the City attorney to prepare a draft ordinance for council consideration so that the City's interests can be protected.
- Staff will present a draft of the ordinance to City council at a future council meeting.

Advisory Committee Support

In addition to the above projects PW staff attends and supports the Waterways Advisory Committee, the Beautification Advisory Committee, and the Hideaway Beach Tax District Committee including the preparation of meeting minutes, conducting research, updating city website related to committee functions, coordinating among committee members, and attending additional meetings, and responding to requests.

Water Quality Action Items

The following table lists the water quality action items being considered or performed by the city. The items appearing in gray text are not recommended, not feasible, and not implemented.
