Guidelines

To ensure that cul-de-sac landscaping improvements by property owners are undertaken in a safe manner and yield expected results, the following guidelines must be followed:

- Property owners to design landscape scheme and submit drawing under a right-of-way permit for approval.
- Property owners to care for and maintain cul-de-sac landscape improvements.
- Select water-wise plantings to minimize water consumption and lower maintenance efforts/costs.
- Select plantings that have low fertilizer, pesticide, and herbicide demands.
- Choose inorganic mulch (shell, stone) as a cost effective alternative to wood mulch products.
- Trim and prune plantings to avoid encroachment into sidewalks and road pavement areas.
- Perimeter treatment limited to FDOT curbing and City Ordinance.

Water-Wise

Plant Tips

- Native plants, which can exist on annual rainfall and are rated drought tolerant per the South Florida Water Management District's "Water-Wise" publication.
- Grow in sandy soil with high pH level above 7.0.
- Require reduced or no pruning.
- Need little additional fertilizer after establishment.
- Plants with no major known pest or disease problems.
- Minimum establishment watering.
- Salt tolerant for its location.
- Planting themes or plant selection need to be based upon many cul-de-sacs being non-irrigated for water conservation purposes.
- Non-invasive roots or foliage to avoid conflicts with overhead or underground utilities and pavement.

<u>Safety</u>

Contact all utility owners prior to digging below ground.

Coordinate safety measures and best management practices while working within the cul-de-sac area.

Property owners must obtain an approved right-of-way permit as outlined in the City Right-Of-Way Handbook.

CUL-DE-SAC LANDSCAPE PLANT SPECIES

Property owners are encouraged to initiate and maintain cul-de-sac landscape improvements to enhance the streetscape environment of the City of Marco Island.

An approved right-of-way permit is required from the Public Works Department (239-389-5002) to get started. The following lists are plant species options that can be used in the cul-de-sac design.

All plants should not grow above 3 feet for sight requirements. The plant species below all require low or no water consumption once established, can grow in sandy soil with a pH level above 7.0, need little or no fertilizer or pesticides, and ultimately have low maintenance.

Plant Species that grow to a 3-foot Height:

Agava	Agava Americana marginata	Green and yellow striped leaves
Bromeliads	Aechinea blanchetiana	Yellow and orange leaves
Scorpion Tail	Helistropium angiospermum	Native, Perennial, white flowers

Plant Species that grow to a 2-foot Height:

Foxtail Fern	Asparagus densiflorus 'myers'	Light green leaves
Spider Lilly	Hymenocallis latifolia	White flowers
Yellow Walking Iris	Neomoria Ionifolia	Yellow flowers
Muhly Grass	Muhlenbergia capillaris	Pink, feathery seed pods
Trailing Lantana	Lantan montevidcinsis	Purple flowers
Juniper Shore	Juniperus conferta	Green leaves
Blue Porterweed	Stachytarpheta jamaicensis	Native species ONLY, Blue flowers
Blanket Flower	Gaillardia putchella	Red, Orange, Yellow flowers
Aloe, Aloe Vera	Aloe bariardemcis	Native, Yellow flowers
Daylily, Evergreen	Hemerocallis hybria	Many flowers, multi-colored
Green Eyes	Berlindiera subacaulis	Yellow flowers

Bulbine	Bulbine fratescents	Yellow and/or orange flowers
Lily turf, Monkey Grass	Lirope muscari	Grass, purple flowers
Perennial Peanut (Echo Turf)	Arachis glabrata Berth	Yellow flowers
Sea Fig	Carpobrutus chilensis	Purple flowers
Gopher Apple	Licania michauxii	Native, yellow flowers
Kalanchoe	Kalanchoe fedtschenkii	Pink scalloped edges
