Programming-Racquet Center

Programming – Mackle Park Community Center

- We are currently working on our Fall brochure. Our room schedule is already filling up for returning and new programming. Pilates, Fitness Fusion, Yoga, & Be Fit Over 50 will all be back starting in October!
- Camp Mackle 2019 was a great success! We had 199 children registered in Camp Mackle & 68 registered in Camp Stellar. We averaged about 74 campers daily.

Facilities Update:

Mackle Park

- Our Spray Park has been down for a couple of weeks. We had 3 leaks in the pipes
 which have been fixed; however, we are now having electrical issues. One
 electrician has informed us that we need a new electrical panel. We have
 contacted another electrician for a second opinion.
- Hydrilla has decreased significantly in the lake.
- A new coil for the AC was ordered and installed.
- The second shade structure for the playground is expected to be installed at the end of August.
- Two picnic tables have been replaced.
- The motor for the fountain in the lake has been fixed.
- We have started painting the playground.

Winterberry Park

- Field is being used for open play.
- The field is being prepped for MIA and MICMS football games.

Veterans Community Park

- The main pump is still under repair. We expect it to be running soon.
- The fountain area lights have been a problem and we are working to resolve.

Racquet Center

- Some of the gate closures have been repaired.
- Material to stop the balls from rolling under the fence is installed.
- The nets behind the stadium court have been changed to a more appealing material.
- Two picnic tables have been replaced.




The Planning Board reviewed and discussed the topic of utility trailer parking which will be considerd by the City Council at their August meeting.

Sea Turtles

Sea Turtle nesting season began on May 1st and runs through October 31st. Below are the recent updates of sea turtle nests in Collier County. Sea turtle lighting violations have increased this season and as a result, staff will be meeting with the Collier County Sea Turtle Monitor and Code Enforcement to discuss ways to minimize lighting violations including providing additional outreach and education to condominiums and hotels along the beach, and possibly proposing revisions to the City Ordinance that outlines sea turtle lighting requirements.

Iguanas

 The removal of Iguanas from residential properties continues on Marco Island. From November 30, 2018 to August 1st, 2019, the trapper has removed a total of 529 iguanas, which has included adult and juvenile iguanas. There is \$3,380 remaining in the budget for this activity. These funds should be exhausted by mid-September.

Mackle Park Lake

• The water conditions at Mackle Park Lake appear to have significantly improved. Staff and the City's lake management company will continue to monitor the conditions. Also, a new inactive Burrowing Owl burrow was removed from the center of the Mackle Park Soccer field on July 2nd. The City had to request an amendment to the FWC permit previously issued in the Fall of 2018, which authorized the removal of four other inactive burrows located on the field. As a requirement of the amendment to the permit, the City had to dig two additional starter burrows at the park. The total cost for the removal of the five inactive burrows at the Park including the services of a consultant, and the required FWC permit & mitigation contribution fees was \$4,100. Staff will be coordinating with FWC to discuss options for a "blanket" permit for inactive burrow removals under certain circumstances (i.e. infrastructure projects, swale work, re-occurring burrows at Mackle Park) so to avoid multiple permit submittals and excessive fees & mitigation requirements.

Red Tide

Below are the red tide results reported by Collier County on July 30th. No dead
fish or respiratory irritation are being reported. The next sampling event will
be July 8th. Results should be available July 9th. Updates on red tide counts can
be also found on the Collier County & FWC websites.

Madeira Condominium Vegetation Removal Violation

 City Code Enforcement & Florida DEP (FDEP) are moving forward with enforcement actions against the Madeira and the contractor responsible for the significant vegetation removal along the beachside of the Madeira condominiums. The City recently issued a Vehicle on the Beach permit to the contractor which authorized only the removal of the large pile of vegetation debris. The City will continue to coordinate with the FDEP on the vegetation restoration and permitting requirements moving forward.

• Tonia Selmeski & Daniel Smith attended the 33rd Annual Environmental Permitting Summer School at the JW Marriott on Marco Island from July 17th – July 19th.
